A lot of work is involved but the schemes of work, lessons and assessments being put together for September already look both exciting and more challenging! Its great to see two fantastic RE departments working closely together!



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Caritas

The Caritas Team have been extremely Muiread, a student in Yr10 our busy. prefect lead for Caritas has decided to lead a group to help raise money and awareness of mental health by supporting the charity 'Mind'. A number of exciting activities are planned to educate students on the work of Mind. We kicked off our campaign the week of 15th - 19th May which is mental health awareness week. The Caritas Ambassadors are already hard at work preparing resources that will be used school wide to raise awareness. Each Friday from now until the end of the summer term we will be sending out our "Mindful Minute" where students and staff will get the opportunity to end their school week by taking a moment to clear their mind and reflect.

On a further note, as a Catholic school can I state that I am really proud of the work that the St Anne's community is doing to support all our families, not just the vulnerable. This Yr we have absorbed two school dinner food price increases, supported families to purchase school uniform and shoes. absorbed costs of food technology ingredients for those that could not afford buy for their practical lessons, to supplemented cost of school visits to reduce burden on families and paid for transport to/from school and alternative education providers. The University of Salford Visit

On Friday 21st April, Yr10 Health and Social Care students experienced life as a university student after visiting the University of Salford where they embarked on a



tour of the University campus. Through simulations, they were immersed in a typical emergency on a hospital ward and engaged with practitioners in the medical



field. In essence, they had the opportunity to 'put into practice', elements they learnt on the Health and Social course and applied it to real life scenarios. Our students fully emerged themselves in the activities and engaged with staff asking questions

and seeing what opportunities there are for the future. Staff at the University complimented our students on their behaviour, their ambition and enthusiasm.





Raising Aspirations

Yr10 will be visiting Aquinas College on 30th June for a taster day learning about college life. They will have the chance to trial a range of lessons, eat in the canteen and mix with other students from Stockport. More information coming about this to parents soon. However, this is an excellent opportunity to raise their aspirations and to think about their futures.



Future Trips

As part of our educational offer at St Anne's, we believe school trips help students gain real-world experiences that cannot be taught in the classroom, opening their minds to different cultures and strengthening their knowledge of the world around them. Therefore, I am delighted to announce two further trip opportunities for our students next academic Yr.

A Geography trip to the Bay of Naples which will provide a great opportunity for our GCSE students to see key aspects of the syllabus come to life including volcanic activity, coastal processes and the resulting formations which provide excellent case studies to aid classroom learning. Local farming, fishing, and tourist industries provide the human geography element (as well as plenty of gastronomic and leisure time benefits). This is a fantastic geography tour option for our GCSE students.

A Spanish trip to the capital of Catalonia, Barcelona, a city that offers a fusion of art, architecture, fashion, and business making it a perfect destination for our Spanish students. They will have an opportunity to improve Spanish subject knowledge, their listening, speaking, and reading skills. They will be able to immerse themselves in Spanish culture, experience their traditional cuisine as well as seeing some of the top sites including Nou Camp, the Olympic Stadium and a wander down Las Ramblas.

Remember that these trips are subject to student 'good' behaviour, attendance, and attitude to their learning. I retain the right to withdraw any student who does not conform to the high expectations at St Anne's.



Yr 11 Update

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Yr11 students have now had several weeks of exams. For the majority of the exams, students have been working exceptionally hard - attending revision at the weekends and before and after school. As a reminder, students should continue to work hard, be in full uniform and follow the high expectations at St Anne's. For example, when not in exams or specific revision sessions, students must attend their 'normal' timetabled lessons up to 14th June. After the Maths exam on 14th June, students are able to study at home and only come into school for specific revision sessions and exams. Revision and exam weekly timetables will be shared on class charts throughout the exam series. A reminder that the date of the Prom is Thursday 29th June, but this is by invitation only.

Yr 10 Work Experience

Yr10 students will be embarking on their work experience from 10th to 14th July. This is an invaluable opportunity for students to experience the world of work, interact with professionals and gain exposure to working life. For those unable to find a placement, we have an amazing World Of Work week planned from visits from Apple or an engineering firm to working at a gym or recycling plant as well as a morning at a top university. If you are able to support any of our Yr10 students during this week, with a placement or a talk about your profession please contact Mrs Simmons at school.

Fundraising at St Anne's

I am delighted to share with you the fantastic fund-raising activities of one of our great students, Skye Baxendale-Burch. Skye has raised £500 pounds by reading many books. The money raised will go towards a charity called 'Crohn's and Colitis'. Skye is doing this to help people like her mum, who has Crohn's, which is an inflammatory bowel disease.

I am inspired by our students who go the extra mile outside of school to demonstrate their drive to support charitable causes.

Parental Feedback

Since the last letter, there have been two further Parents' Evenings, Yr9 and Yr10. Thanks to all the parents that have attended these. It really is an excellent opportunity for you to hear how your child is doing at St Anne's. The outcomes of these were overall positive, but in some questionnaire returns, parents raised justified issues. I ask that in the future parents write their names on these so that we can follow up in a timely manner. I have followed up all issues raised where parents put their names on the returns. St Anne's is rapidly improving, and further improvements can't be sustained without the support of parents. It is crucial that all parents embrace the positive changes and engage with the school. I add a few comments, one positive and one an issue from each Yr group below for your perusal.

Yr10 comments;

Positive: School is unrecognisable from when my daughter started. So happy! The improvement, commitment and dedication of ALL staff, helpers, pupils, our whole school family is palpable and continues to grow from strength to strength. Thank you!

Issue raised: The school team have listened to our concerns and responded re poor attainment although we do not agree with the statement 'my child does well as this school'.

Yr9 comments;

Positive: Last Yr I would not have agreed with any of overleaf however my son seems much happier and is also doing well at school. He is highly thought of and we all agree that school seems much calmer with less disruptive lessons. Thank you for the support. *Issue raised:* I have sometimes felt that teachers could have higher aspirations for my child e.g. promote going to university/ Russell?? I was once told "well this is a special measures school" by a teacher. It has felt that educational aspirations could be higher.

The staff and I are working relentlessly

to ensure that your child gets at least a 'good education'. This also includes teaching a strong academic curriculum, underpinned by high expectations. I can say with great authority that the culture of St Anne's has changed massively and that we no longer accept low expectations. Equally, I am also conscious that we are not there yet.



Safeguarding Update

Recognise, Respond, Record, Refer

Safeguarding our children continues to be our number one priority and we have comprehensive provision in place to ensure this continue to be effective.

Staff training: Further training has included Prevent, FGM, and reviewing our safeguarding policies. Staff knowledge of our students is strong and therefore **RECOGNISING** and **RECORDING** any concerns. The safeguarding team **RESPOND** to all **REPORTED** concerns and referrals are subsequently made to support your child moving forward, ultimately keeping them safe.

Sextortion

This is a form of child sexual exploitation where children are threatened or blackmailed, most often with the possibility of publicly sharing nude or sexual images by a person who demands additional sexual content, sexual activity or money. Sextortion cases are increasingly common. I ask that parents speak openly to their children about the dangers of sextortion. It could happen to *YOUR* child.

Cost of Living Crisis

Sadly, the St Anne's community is not immune to this. Catholic schools were created to support/help the vulnerable and at St Anne's we ask that if you feel you need some support please contact Miss Rees at the school, our safeguarding lead. 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
Mental Health Week

Attendance Update

As I have said in many of my previous newsletters, attendance is a very important aspect of your child's education. There is little doubt that good attendance correlates very strongly with good academic achievement. In essence, if your child is not in school, then they can't learn. The St Anne's 'attendance' team are working extremely hard to ensure our attendance is good. Indeed, a member of the Stockport Welfare Team recently visited St Anne's to scrutinise our attendance procedures and was highly impressed with our diligence and hard work to improve attendance. In particular, she commented that how well *"staff know the students and are* willing *to get the actions done"*. I politely ask that you ensure that your child attends school regularly.

I am delighted to announce our summer reward trip to Blackpool Pleasure Beach. Spaces are limited and students will be selected based on excellent attendance, punctuality and behaviour. Students who make the effort and improve their overall attendance will also be eligible for this trip. More details to follow. At this stage can I say a massive thank you to all parents/carers working with their child and school to ensure excellence attendance.

Yr 9 Update

A massive thanks to the parents and students who attended the Yr9 Parents Evening/ Options Evening. It was fantastic seeing the students and parents talking to the teachers about their progress. A special thank you to the Yr10 student leadership team who did a great job helping in reception and catering for staff and parents with refreshments. Mrs Sutcliffe has been impressed with the students' engagement in the options process, including asking many pertinent questions to help them with their choices. Mrs Sutcliffe informs me that all options forms are handed in. We will share the outcomes of the options process in due course.

I am delighted to introduce our new Head Boy, Alex McDonagh and Head Girl, Anaya Cowley. Both pupils went through a rigorous interview process and amazed both Mrs Simmons and myself with their dedication to St Anne's and their commitment to the school. Below are a few words from them both.

Head Girl, Anaya Cowley: I am extremely proud and honoured to be Head Girl at St Anne's. I have the students' best interests at heart and I want St Anne's to thrive. Through my tenure I wish to work with students and the school leaders to support mental health initiatives as this is an issue affecting so many students. What I most love about St Anne's is that it is a small school where everybody feels included and where we uphold our SACRED values. It is similar to a family where we respect and

treat each other how we would want to be treated and where you feel listened to. It is a wonderful place to be and I am very proud to be the Head Girl for this school and community.

Head Boy, Alex McDonagh: I am very proud to be Head Boy at St Anne's. I strive to embody the SACRED Values and act as a role model to all students. St Anne's has given me many opportunities to better myself, such as being a part of the football and basketball team and giving me the opportunity to go to Amsterdam. I will continue to provide opportunities to others by working with Anaya, Head Girl, to improve the Mental Health of pupils. I have already begun this work through the Active in Mind project which has allowed me to build relationships and mentor Yr 7 and Yr 8 students. As Head Boy I will work with staff, students and parents to make St Anne's an outstanding school which serves our community.





Welcoming Environment

We have warmly welcomed a number of Iranian students to St Anne's, aided by Iranian students who are already established here. As part of this transition, we are fortunate to have 2 translators and I am delighted to share an email I received from one of the translators. ""I have been working with St Anne's for 6 months and school has been very supportive and welcoming to students who have moved to the UK recent, especially those who need extra support in overcoming the language barrier. My job has been to help facilitate the integration of these students into high school. My experience with St Anne's has been very positive, the staff are friendly, kind and very motivated to aid these students. The teachers have also been very receptive to improvement opportunities I have raised and have communicated effectively and efficiently to implement such changes". Inclusion is part of the St Anne's culture!

Immunisation Feedback

Following the recent immunisation clinic at school we received an email from Nicola O'Neill, a Specialist Community Public Health School Nurse. It stated the following "

"Good morning. I am writing to thank you for all your support during the immunisation session. The sessions ran really well, and the students were a credit to the school.
