Bishop John Arnold Visits St Anne's for a Very Special Planting

We have been honoured to welcome Bishop John Arnold to St Anne's on the last day of term for a very special occasion. During his visit, Bishop John blessed and helped to plant our new Ginkgo biloba sapling, kindly organised by Mr Swift, as part of the Hiroshima Green Legacy Project. This international initiative preserves and shares saplings from trees that survived the atomic bombing of Hiroshima in 1945 - known as hibakujumoku - as powerful symbols of peace, hope, and resilience.

We are incredibly proud to be part of this global movement for peace; St Anne's will be the only location in Stockport to receive such a sapling. The Bishop's visit and the planting of this remarkable tree remind us of our call to nurture faith, peace, and care for creation in our community and beyond.

Anchor of Hope – St. Mary on the Hill

At the end of September, our school passed on the Anchor of Hope to St Mary's Primary School, Stockport, continuing its journey around the Emmaus Trust. Five members of our GIFT Team represented St Anne's, joining St Mary's for a special assembly to celebrate faith and unity across our schools.





During the service, Fatoumata shared a heartfelt prayer on behalf of our community, reminding everyone of the strength and hope we find when we place our trust in God.

Caritas update

So far this term, students have been introduced to what being 'caritas' means, and how we can serve our community. We have begun making advent fundraising plans to contribute to the Advent Appeal. This term, students are making environment-related Christmas cards to go in these Advent Appeal hampers. They are basing them on the environment, linking them to the Bishop's visit to plant the sapling in our prayer garden. Next term we will begin fundraisings for the Advent hampers.

OPEN EVENING

We opened our doors to over 250 families for a spectacular Open Evening on Thursday 9th October, proudly celebrating the theme: "Twice Recognised as a Good Catholic School". The event was a vibrant showcase of everything that makes St Anne's a place of excellence, faith, and community.

From the moment families arrived, they were warmly welcomed by our senior prefects, whose professionalism and enthusiasm set the tone for the evening. Families were invited to explore the school's departments, each offering a unique and engaging experience that brought learning to life.

In Science, visitors were treated to thrilling experiments - including dramatic explosions that had everyone talking. History took a bold step into the past with a hands-on activity testing urine as part of a medieval medicine demonstration. Food Technology offered a sensory delight with jellybean taste tests and cake decorating, while Design Technology invited guests to craft their own wooden keyrings. PE kept the energy high with interactive games and challenges and RE transformed into a welcoming RE Café, where families explored world religions through displays and tasted traditional foods from different cultures. This was an inspiring celebration of diversity and understanding.

During the course of the evening, I delivered a speech to families to share with them the heart of our school's mission. I introduced them to St Anne's Way and our SACRED Values, and spoke about the deep-rooted ethos that guides our community. The atmosphere was electric, filled with laughter, curiosity, and pride. Parents and students alike left with a clear sense of what makes St Anne's so special, not just our academic excellence, but our commitment to nurturing the whole child.

This Open Evening wasn't just an event, it was a celebration of St Anne's commitment to achievement, and faith. Twice recognised, and truly deserving.







YEAR 11 MOCK EXAMS

YEAR 11 ATTENDANCE

As of the time of writing, Year 11 attendance stands at 88.9%. This is well below what I would expect in a year group that is going to be sitting their GCSE exams in a few months time! I ask that parents/carers support the school and their child in ensuring that attendance is the highest priority. For avoidance of doubt, students that attend, achieve. On a positive note, 48 students have 100% attendance.

YEAR 11 INTERVENTION

Targeted intervention takes place during Period 6 from 3.10-4.10pm. Staff are using this time to work with students to improve their grades - particularly at grades 4 and 5. Attendance to these sessions is compulsory for those students that are selected to attend. On the whole, attendance to these intervention sessions has been good. I would, however, like to remind students and parents that if your child is invited to intervention, it is imperative that they attend. These sessions are targeted and therefore it can only support them in their studies. There have been some students that have missed sessions in the past couple of weeks without a reasonable excuse. Feedback from the intervention sessions is very positive, and those attending regularly are working hard during the sessions.

KEY 2 SUCCESS: Thursday 2nd October

Year 9: Miss Morgan delivered an engaging Key 2 Success presentation to Year 9 parents and carers recently, centred on maintaining high expectations for student achievement and how parents can play an active role in supporting learning at home. She highlighted the importance of good attendance, following school rules, making informed choices for GCSE options, and getting involved in the wider life of the school. Key dates were also shared, including those for the upcoming Options Evening and the release of assessment reports.

Year 8: Mrs McGloin delivered the Key 2 Success presentation focusing on the importance of excellent attendance and students having a positive attitude to learning. The priorities for this year group are; attend school (97% or higher attendance), to leave each lesson having learnt the key information, complete homework to secure their knowledge and prepare fully for assessments, so that the students can see the progress they are making over time. Mrs McGloin also spoke about the importance of being a positive member

of our school community; demonstrating our SACRED values, attending extra-curricular activities and students upholding high standards for themselves at all times. Mrs McGloin expressed her hope that this year group maximises their time and potential whilst they are part of the St Anne's community and shared with parents the positive impression that the majority of Year 8 students have made since returning to school in September. Key dates for the year were shared, including the dates for the Castlerigg retreat taking place in March 2026.



YEAR 10 TARGETS

This half term, we have been reviewing how we set academic targets for students as they begin their chosen GCSE courses. While strong results in English and mathematics remain important, we also want our students to feel motivated to aim high across all their subjects and to take pride in their progress.

After the half-term break, we will be sharing these new targets with your child. You will also receive a short report outlining their effort and engagement so far. We encourage you to talk with your child about their targets and how they can continue to build good study habits. As they begin their two-year GCSE journey, developing consistent routines and a positive attitude to learning now will set the foundation for success in Year 11 and beyond.

YEAR 7: MEET THE FORM TUTOR EVENING

Last month, we were delighted to welcome Year 7 parents and carers to our 'Meet the Form Tutor' evening. The feedback was overwhelmingly positive, with 100% of parents agreeing that their child had settled well into secondary school life, that any issues were handled effectively, and that they felt well supported during the transition from primary school.

We also appreciated the thoughtful comments and suggestions shared by parents. Where concerns were raised, we acted promptly:

- One parent experienced difficulty accessing Arbor; we contacted them the following day and resolved the issue.
- Some parents were unsure about the Extra-Curricular timetable. We responded by sharing it via Arbor and clearly signposting its location on the school website.
- A few parents mentioned uncertainty around homework. At the time, homework was not yet visible on Arbor, but this has now been addressed homework is now shared with both students and parents/carers through the app.

For those seeking curriculum information, we directed all Year 7 families to the relevant documents on our website.

We are grateful for the open communication and continued partnership with our families as we work together to support our students' success.

YEAR 7 PROUD EVENING

On Wednesday, 22nd October, Year 7 students presented their showcase event, *Proud*. The evening was a resounding success, offering parents/carers, staff and students an engaging and enjoyable experience. Designed as a journey through the Year 7 curriculum, the event highlighted the students' learning and personal achievements.

The showcase opened with a beautiful rendition of *Sing It in the Valleys*, performed by the entire year group, setting a vibrant and uplifting tone for the night. Each class performed their chosen song, including popular hits such as *'I Want It That Way'*, *'Unwritten'*, and *'Firework'*. Interwoven throughout the evening were moments where students shared what made them feel "proud," with presentations ranging from acrobatics and fishing to heartfelt accounts of 10K memory walks in honour of cancer victims.

Two stunning solo vocal performances captivated the audience - Tamera D's powerful delivery of 'Could Have Been Me' from Sing 2 and Aimee-Faye F's moving performance of 'Electricity' from Billy Elliot.

The evening was a celebration of talent, dedication, and community spirit, leaving parents and staff immensely proud of the Year 7 cohort's achievements and enthusiasm.



TEACHING AND LEARNING

On 1st October, we hosted the inaugural breakfast meeting of our newly established Professional Learning Group (PLG). The PLG aims to foster meaningful professional dialogue around the key aspects of teaching and learning that directly impact our student outcomes. It also reflects our ongoing commitment to maintaining a dynamic, reflective teaching and learning culture that puts students at the heart of all we do.

The focus of our first meeting was the question: "What makes assessment effective?" Colleagues engaged in

thoughtful discussion, sharing insights and experiences on how assessment can serve as a powerful tool for learning - encouraging students to take greater responsibility for their academic progress and setting high expectations for them at both KS3 and KS4.

At our next meeting, the group will turn its attention to a timely and important topic: the role of Artificial Intelligence (AI) in education - exploring its potential, limitations, and the ways it might meaningfully support both teaching and learning. Thanks to all the teachers who came in to work earlier than usual to take part in the PLG.


Ms Cook, Head of English

YEAR 11 PARENTS' EVENING

Year 11 Parents' Evening took place on Thursday 23rd October. This was an opportunity for parents/carers to speak to teachers about their child's effort and engagement so far in Year 11, and what preparation is required for the mock exams that start in December.

There was a great atmosphere in the room and lots of positivity about how hard the vast majority of students are working towards their exams. I would like to thank all the parents/carers that attended and for the feedback that was provided on the parental questionnaires. As a leadership team, we will be analysing this data and contacting any parents that raised a concern so that it can be resolved.

READING GROUPS

At St Anne's, we proudly deliver a robust academic curriculum. This opens up more opportunities for our students post-16. However, all students need to be able to access the curriculum through reading and understanding. As part of this process, the senior leadership team are involved in weekly 'reading groups' with the aim to improve students' comprehension skills. Below is an overview of these reading groups.

Mrs Simmons: Year 7 have been thoroughly enjoying their weekly reading sessions with the captivating novel 'The Boy with a Butterfly Mind' by Victoria Williamson. The story follows Elin and Jamie - two very different characters whose lives unexpectedly intertwine. As we read, we've been exploring their personalities, emotions, and challenges, and it's sparked some brilliant discussions in class. We've made predictions about what might happen next, and we're eagerly turning each page to see if we're right!



One of the highlights has been discovering new vocabulary. Each week, we collect unfamiliar words, discuss their meanings, and challenge ourselves to use them during our lessons. The book has opened up conversations about friendship, family, and understanding others, and we're excited to see how Elin and Jamie's journey unfolds.

Mr Ostmeier: Mr Ostmeier and the Year 8 group are currently reading '*Trash*' by Andy Mulligan'. This book focuses on three boys (Raphael, Gardo and Rat) who live on a heap of trash, sifting through rubbish to make a living. One day they find something extraordinary and from that moment they are hunted without mercy. But they can't run for ever - they need a miracle!



The students in the reading group are enjoying the book and asking lots of questions. We have spoken about the contrast between the rich and the poor in the book, and the fact that the book is loosely based on a place the author visited in Manila.

Mrs Sutcliffe: Mrs Sutcliffe is currently reading 'Journey's End' by R.C. Sherriff, with a group of Year 9 boys. This powerful play, which was later successfully adapted into a film, is set on the front line during the First World War and explores the horror and futility of trench warfare. As it's a play rather than a novel, our reading sessions are a little different; each of us takes on a character and brings the dialogue to life. The boys are really engaging with the text and are enjoying the challenge of reading aloud using the soldiers' authentic dialect. We can't wait to get to the end of the scenes to find out what happens to Captain Stanhope and his officers who spend three cruel years on the front line.



WORLD MENTAL HEALTH DAY

School was a vibrant sea of yellow on 10th October as we came together to mark World Mental Health Day. From yellow socks and bows to cheerful headbands and coats worn proudly over uniforms, students and staff alike showed their support for this important cause with colour and spirit.

This year's theme - "Mental health in a world of constant crisis" - encouraged reflection on how we care for ourselves amid ongoing global challenges. Form-time activities focused on recognising what we can and can't control, using a bright yellow sun to reflect on this, helping students build emotional resilience. Our Mental Health Ambassadors led assemblies across year groups, sharing practical advice on managing wellbeing, avoiding doomscrolling, and staying hopeful in the face of constant news.

In a world where bad news often feels constant and overwhelming, our Mental Health Ambassadors delivered powerful assemblies that offered both understanding and practical advice. They addressed the growing habit of 'doomscrolling', the endless consumption of negative news online, and encouraged students to set healthy boundaries with media, take breaks from screens, and seek out positive stories and real-life connection. Most importantly, they reminded us that even in uncertain times, hope is a choice we can keep making.









It was a powerful reminder that mental health matters every day - and that together, we can support each other through anything.


SPOOKY WRITING COMPETITION
